**Guest Speaker Dr. Miriam Klein Kassenoff
Child Refugee Of The Holocaust
Education Specialist / Holocaust Studies**

As a young girl, Miriam Klein Kassenoff and her family fled Nazi Europe in 1940-1941. Hear the riveting story of their escape and hiding, eventually reaching Lisbon, Portugal—a crossroads to freedom for her and many other Jews fleeing the Holocaust.

Today, Miriam shares her story of escape and rescue in her role as the Chair of Education at the Holocaust Memorial in Miami Beach, Florida. She is responsible for all staff development/teacher training on “Teaching the Holocaust: Elementary through High School” in Miami/Dade Public Schools and is an appointee to the Florida Governor’s Task Force on Holocaust Education.



**Guest Speaker Ethan Bensinger
Director, REFUGE: Stories of the SelfHelp Home**

In 2007, Ethan Bensinger created an archive of personal interviews with 30 residents of SelfHelp Home who had been victims of Nazi persecution. SelfHelp Home is resourceful community that, over generations, has brought together more than 1,000 Central European Jewish refugees and Holocaust survivors under one roof.

That project inspired Ethan to film REFUGE: STORIES OF THE SELFHELP HOME, a one-hour documentary that highlights the diverse experiences of six of those Selfhelp residents and three of the home’s founders, before, during, and after WWII. REFUGE was awarded “Best Documentary” and “Best in Fest” at the 2012 Sycamore Film Festival.
